

Introduction




This document is to help you understand what help you can get to travel to school, 6th form, college or a training centre.



The travel assistance and help with costs is for some young people with additional needs aged between 16 and 25.



Councils do not have to help young people with travel to school, college, training or social care once they are of sixth form age (this means year 12 and above) but they have to let you know what help you may be able to get.



If you are carrying on in education post 16 you must reapply for travel support even if you have had help to get to school.



We also have an All Age Travel Assistance Policy which can also tell you what help you may be able to get.



We want to help children, young people and adults be as independent as they can be. We will work together to make this happen in a way that is right for them.



We will make sure that people are safe and protected from harm.

Transport & Travel Support



Wolverhampton has lots of public transport available like buses, trains and the metro.



16-18 Photocard

Travel for West Midlands (TfWM) provide help with travel tickets for young people in Wolverhampton.



16 to 18 year olds going to school, college or a training centre can get a free 16-18 photocard which lets them buy half price tickets and passes for buses, trams and trains in the West Midlands.

Disabled Persons Free Travel Pass

Disabled young people (who are eligible and meet the criteria) can travel for free by bus anywhere in England during off peak times with the Disabled Persons Free Travel Pass. They can also use the pass to travel on local trains and metro during off peak times.


Off Peak times are between 9.30am and 11.00pm Monday to Friday, all day at weekends and on public holidays.

If they need to travel before 9:30am they can purchase a £1.50 single-fare ticket on all National Express buses or an add on ticket can be purchased.

The plans will also look at how to get more children and young people walking, cycling and using public transport.




Secondary schools will also have information for new drivers about using mobile phones whilst traveling.

Connexions Wolverhampton



Connexions Wolverhampton has internet access available in the Civic Centre for young people to use to search for travel options; help can also be provided to use the internet.



Connexions can also help with the cost of travel to connexions, training, school and college, if their family does not have much money.



During your last year at school, Connexions will produce a Career Pathway Plan.

For pupils with EHCPs these identify learning needs and help they will need to get to school, college or training.

The 16-19 Bursary Fund

A bursary scheme which pays £1200 per year to help with costs for the most vulnerable 16-19 year olds in full time education.



School / college hardship bursary fund

Money may be available to help pay for transport, books and other items

To find out whether you can claim this award you need to contact your school/college direct to see if you are eligible.


Discretionary Learner Support



Learner Support funding may be available to young people aged 19 in further education if their family does not have much money.



Call 0800 121 8989 or visit www.gov.uk/discretionarylearner-support for more information.



Applications for learner support can be made to your college or training provider.

The money can help with:

- Somewhere to live
- Travel
- Book and equipment
- Childcare

Support from the City of Wolverhampton Council



Councils do not have to help young people with travel to school, college, training or social care once they are of sixth form age (this means year 12 and above).



To get help, they must live in the city of Wolverhampton



Some young people going to colleges, sixth form or training may get travel assistance in certain cases. This could be that they would not be able to continue with their learning if they did not get help.



To get help, they must go to the nearest school, college or training centre that is right for them.



To get help, they must be able to show they cannot get to college, sixth form or training centre any other way.



To get help, they must be aged 16 to 19 or have started the course they are on before their 19th birthday.



To get help, they must go to college, sixth form or training for more than 15 hours each week.



They must be willing to pay some money towards the cost of their transport. If they are able to have transport, they will have to pay £600 a year or £300 if their family does not earn much money.



The Council will check that transport is still needed every year.



Transport will normally only be provided at the start and end of the school, college or training centre day. You may be able to travel at other times in certain cases.

Adult Learners age 19 to 25



The Council wants to help young adults to carry on learning to become more independent, if they want to.



Most young adults should be able to get to where they learn without help from the Council. We may provide help in certain cases when there are extra support needs.



When deciding if they need help the Council will look at the young person's age, ability, needs and how difficult it is to get to their place of learning.



To get help, they must live in the City of Wolverhampton.



To get help, they must go to the nearest college, sixth form or training centre that is right for them.



Help may also not be given if it would be possible for them to use the higher rate mobility component of their personal independence payment or their 'motability' vehicle.



They must be able to show they cannot get to their place of learning any other way.

Travel Training



Independent travel training can be arranged. This can help children, young people and adults to travel safely and independently.

All qualifying post 16 students will be individually assessed for travel training. If travel training is right for them they will receive training to develop life skills and travel independently on public transport and issued with a travel pass.

Apprenticeships



The City of Wolverhampton Council does not offer any travel assistance to apprenticeships or traineeships. For more information please contact your training provider or work placement.

Those not in education, employment or training



The Council does not offer any travel assistance for individuals that are Not in Education. **Employment, or Training**

Workwise

Workwise offers travel assistance to some jobseekers and apprentices who have started a new job by offering a 50% discount off the full-cost purchase price of travel passes for up to 3 months.

The scheme can also help those who are currently working and are increasing their working hours to 16 or more per week.

When waiting for a decision, it is expected that parents and carers get their children to school safely. We will write to you and let you know what the decision is.

Appeals



If a young person, their family or carers do not agree with the home to school travel assistance they have been offered they can tell us.

The Council will look at the plan and may change it or keep it the same.



The Council will look at the plan and may change it or keep it the same.



If the young person, family member or carer are still not happy, they can tell an independent panel why that is.

The panel is independent because none if its members would have helped make the original decision.

The panel will decide if the Council made the right decision and decide if the plan is kept the same or changed.
